PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE....

We are writing our message this month from Denver, CO. We left CR on August 19 for a nostalgic drive to Vancouver and the World Conference. For 9 days, we traveled the Black Hills, Glacier National Park in Montana, and the Canadian Rockies in Alberta and British Columbia. We had both been to many of these places with our parents, but had never returned as adults. We had a great time even though we did encounter wildfire smoke many of the days.

The World Conference turned out to be a great experience. Mary Stull and Connie Williams were our clubs official representatives and we can tell you they did a great job of networking with representatives from around the world - - 23 countries were represented. Cheryl and I are glad we decided to make this trip on our own as we found our knowledge of the organization and FFI staff to be far greater, and therefore, more helpful, than when we went to New Orleans just two years ago.

Many contacts were made including persons met on past exchanges and members from clubs offering the potential of future exchanges. We also met three ladies from Wessex area of England who will be hosting our club next June. They seemed ready and anxious for our arrival.

So, now Chery and I have made our way to Denver where we are staying with our two grandchildren, Emma (5) and Charlie (3), for 8 days while mom and dad are on a vacation. Busy time, but it still gives us a little time to reflect on things learned at the conference. Here are a few highlights:

- 1. Most clubs are struggling with declining membership. This is quite natural as our demographic is getting older. Clubs that can overcome this issue will be in the best position to be successful in the future.
- 2. FFI is struggling to maintain a balanced budget. This is primarily driven by reliance on fees from exchanges as their primary revenue source. Budgets are based on the assumption that most exchanges will be filled to capacity. This model was true for a very long time, but in recent years many clubs struggle to fill exchanges to capacity. Even though FFI has put a "fill the seats" policy in place, many exchanges still go unfilled. In the future, it appears that clubs that can demonstrate they can fill the seats will have an advantage in getting the "matches" they want. Building relationships and even partnerships with other domestic clubs may serve as a helpful strategy in meeting this challenge.

3. Most clubs, even those located in "prime travel" areas, are anxious to make new contacts that may be interested in future exchanges. Making contacts who will eventually request our club for an exchange is an important step in the overall process. Clubs who can implement lasting strategies to make new contacts and maintain old contacts will be in a better position to acquire exchanges in the future.

So, this brings us to the last quarter of our Friendship Force Year. This has been a very busy year, but you have responded to every challenge. We are truly grateful! We are disappointed that the Mexico exchange will not happen and that the Moldova Open World has been delayed; but nevertheless the activities have been many this year. Still coming up is the General Meeting on September 13, a weekend exchange with the Central Iowa Club on October 23 - 25, and the Annual Meeting on November 15.

We are sorry we will miss the General Meeting (still in Denver) as "Kids Against Hunger" is an important mission for us. We do plan to go on the Central lowa Exchange and hope many of you will join us. If you have not experienced the ISU campus, especially in the fall, that alone will be worth the trip.


Outgoing Exchange to Ames, October 23





Global Exchanges

Have you wondered exactly what a Global exchange is? Perhaps you've heard our club members talk about the global exchanges they participated in or seen global exchanges announced in the e-mail notices we get from FFI. It's a perfect fit for those who can't travel when our club is going on an exchange or for those who want to pursue special interests and meet FFI members from around the world.

Global Exchanges are designed to attract applicants from all over the world to join a single exchange. Participants make their own travel arrangements to and from the host community. The whole exchange planning process is completed by the host club. Global exchange participants are recruited with assistance from FFI and use of its email marketing system. Steve Williams has led a global exchange to Azerbaijan; Connie and Myron Williams participated in an Australian Country Music and Wine exchange with several clubs in Australia in January.

Themed Exchanges are organized to bring people together around a particular personal or professional interest. The host program mainly focuses on that theme. Examples include:

- a. Special interest: gardening, biking, hiking, quilting, history, environmental interests, etc.
- b. Humanitarian: ambassadors engage in special humanitarian projects.
- c. Language Learning: Exchanges are designed for language instruction and practice.
- d. Teachers: Specifically designed for teachers or school administrators, these exchanges include school visits, discussions with other educators, in-the-classroom experience and/or professional development components. The Legacy Fund may be used for scholarships in some cases.
- e. Students: Examples of past student exchanges include high school band exchanges and English language exchanges. Possibilities for other types of student exchanges may be considered.

Our club is working with the Central lowa club to plan an exchange on Quilting in the Midwest in fall 2016. See details in future newsletters.

Discover Exchanges give Friendship Force members a thorough cultural introduction to new countries or regions, particularly where hosting may be limited or not yet available. Discover exchanges feature well-developed and thorough cultural programs, but may include only a brief home stay or even none at all. Current Discover destinations include Morocco, Vietnam, Argentina and Italy, among others.

Highlights of 2015 Friendship Force International Conference, August 28-31

Building Bridges, the International Conference held in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, was attended by approximately 500 members from 23 countries. Mary Stull, Connie Williams, Dale and Cheryl Moore represented our club. The Vancouver, BC club, the FFI office staff, field representatives and board of directors provided an exceptional program. We appreciated that Friendship Force hospitality on a grand scale.

Festivities began on Friday evening with a reception featuring the beautiful vocals of the Vancouver Welsh Men's Choir and including a powerful and impromptu sing along to "Let There Be Peace On Earth." Over the next two days of speakers, workshops and social events, we had many opportunities to network with other clubs worldwide.

We made international connections with club members from Korea, South Africa, Australia, Taiwan, Canada and the United Kingdom, including three members of the Wessex club who look forward to our June 2016 exchange. Domestic connections were made with: Dallas, TX; Denver, CO; Lancaster, PA; Whidbey Island, WA; Western KY; Sacramento, CA; E Washington/N Idaho; Long Island; Northern Colorado, Kansas and Portland, OR. We should have many wonderful exchange opportunities over the next few years.

Speakers at several general and workshop sessions of the conference emphasized the social and fiscal importance of full exchanges. Every canceled or under-capacity exchange represents a loss in revenue for FFI and this affected our organization's balance sheet in the past year. While FFI is stable, the continuation of this trend is not sustainable. Strategic planning for the future will need to start now, as one speaker noted: "Some is not a number, and soon is not a time".

In order to work through this issue, clubs are encouraged to list club-to -club exchanges in the catalog, so applications from other FF members can be considered to fill exchanges. Themed exchanges, focusing on global participants with specific interests, are encouraged. And donations from clubs or individuals were requested to update the FFI website, in order to keep pace and grow with the on-line world.

Innovations such as NextGen for All, including family, friend and younger prospective members were discussed. Each club will need to move toward providing opportunities to promote and grow their clubs, whether it be recruiting students, families or those prospects 10 years younger than current members. There are always opportunities, especially when we include community and college volunteers with a common heritage to the visiting ambassadors.

Upon reflection, we are certainly happy with the rich history and promising future of our CR/IC FF Club. We are actively engaged with FF clubs in the re-

gion and worldwide. We also will co-host more exchanges in the future, such as the Nashika Riverside, India, exchange being planned with Madison, WI, in July 2016. Our World Friendship gathering each March brings in exchange students and their families, as well as Kirkwood students. Also, we are open to meeting, hosting and visiting a world full of new friends.
